Dear Friends,

It's been a while since you've had a letter from me in this Newsletter, but I hope that my contributions to this issue will more than make up for it!

Last year was another wonderful one for RSLI - so much beautiful playing, so much learning and progress, and so much fun and support for each other in our music-making! This is what being a Recorder Society is all about! The playing meetings, workshops and soiree were all fabulous in their different ways, and I'm hoping that this coming season we can enjoy more of the same, with, as always, a slightly different cast of characters.

I'm thrilled to now share with you the details of our amazing line-up of teachers for the year, not only for our playing meetings but also for our amazing workshops. This year I will share the playing meeting leader's music stand with talented colleagues, both familiar and new to RSLI, from the tri-state area and beyond, including Larry Zukof, Emily O'Brien, Daphna Mor, Valerie Horst, Wendy Powers, Larry Lipnik and Susan Thompson. I can guarantee you'll experience both new-to-you music and familiar styles, learn (and re-learn) something to improve your playing, and be energized by our group's achievements.

I'm also delighted by the range of workshops we are offering this year, beginning with our unique Skills Workshop, to be held on Saturday October 12. This one-day workshop has achieved great success in recent iterations, and has now evolved from its original dedication to less-experienced players to include players of all levels who want to improve their ensemble playing skills - from sight-reading to listening to rhythms to tuning to changing instruments to working with different meters to... Essentially, the workshop will be tailored to whatever challenges you face when making music with others! Workshop participants are expected to play at least 2 sizes instruments (ideally both c and f fingerings) and will be selected to form a cohesive group of players who can all learn from each other in a very supportive environment. A fun and rewarding experience will be had by all! An e-flyer including an application form will be going out imminently, so watch your inbox.

Those who have enjoyed her teaching in the past will be excited to know that I will be joined by the inimitable Gwyn Roberts for our annual Fall One-Day Workshop on Saturday November 23. This workshop features small group playing (up to 8 advanced or 12 intermediate players in each class) and will include a smorgasbord of musical delights for recorder ensembles from a wide range of musical styles. In previous years, this workshop has enjoyed more than 2 groups of players on occasion, and, as I did then, in the event of enthusiastic enrollment I will hire another inspiring teacher to join us. We aim, as at all our workshops, for wellmatched and congenial groups for our teachers to get the best out of. As with our Skills Workshop, we hope to get an e-flyer for this into your hands (via your inbox) in the very near future.

Both our playing meetings and workshops are open to nonmembers as well as members, so please invite your recorder-playing friends to join us for any and all events. The more the merrier! First-time visitors to our playing meetings even get their first session free. At our workshops, RSLI members enjoy priority notification and registration in addition to discounted fees, but we also welcome players from "off the island", and regularly enjoy the company of players from NYC, Westchester, Connecticut and beyond. However, we set up these events especially for our members in response to their requests and enthusiasms, so please be sure to make the most of our wonderful music program!

I look forward to seeing you all at our various chapter events this year. I'm looking forward, as always, to beginning the season with our first playing meeting this coming Saturday September 14. Before then, be sure to dust off those recorder cases, swab out the wooden instruments and give the plastic ones a bath, and don't forget to throw a music stand, pencil and cushion into your bag along with your recorders. And it never hurts to play a little beforehand either!

"It's not Magic, it's Neurology"

Gwyn Roberts talks about recorder practice tecnique in the most recent issue of "American Recorder". I'm sure you will find it very interesting to learn what is going on physically and neurologically when you practice. It turns out taking a break and even sleeping is essential to the learning process. Also practicing slowly at first and stopping at the point of mastery at a slow tempo helps the brain to consolidate what you have learned for better playing at a faster tempo. Serap Bastepe-Gray, a physician and professional musician and one of the founders of the Johns Hopkins Center for Music and Medicine discusses how to practice smart. "Most musicians believe that they are improving during practice. In reality, most of the neurological and physiological processes that lead to adaptation happen after practice is over...Sleep...is very important."

Report from the ARS Representative:

The ARS just sent its most recent magazine issue, Fall, 2019, to members, featuring wonderful articles about the 20th Biennial Boston Early Music Festival, Gwyn Roberts weighing in on the neurology of practice in conversation with Serap Bastepe-Gray and a number of other topics. Report from the Treasurer:

As of September 2019, RSLI has a balance of \$10,578. We have an estimate of expenses for the year of \$3600.00 for rent, conductor's fees, and insurance. This does not include any additional expenses for workshops, refreshments, etc.

Last year was an excellent year for income, we were blessed with generous donations. Our income was \$10991.05 and our expenses were \$8913.94. The Advanced Spring workshop was not only a huge pedagogical and musical success, we were also in the green, taking in \$4720 in registration fees and spending \$4060 with a positive cash flow of \$660.

As we look forward to another wonderful year of playing meetings and workshops, please keep in mind:

We have a designated scholarship fund to assist anyone who finds the workshop fees, playing fees or dues a hardship. Please contact me if you have any questions about this.

We would also encourage anyone who can do so to contribute to RSLI and to the scholarship fund. RSLI is a not-for-profit 501c3 organization, so your gift is tax deductible.

Margaret Brown kicked off the proceedings on alto recorder, playing "Silvester in der Morgenstond" by the 17th century Dutch composer, Jacob Van Eyck. She was followed by Liz Yenetchi and Diana Foster demonstrating their talents on other early music instruments, baroque flute and viola da gamba respectively, with a Gavotte and Allemande by French baroque composer, Jacques-Martin Hotteterre. Kara Kvilekval and Beverley O'Connor continued the Hotteterre theme with a Passacaille, this time on two alto recorders. "The Baroque Group", featuring Jean Johnston, Kara Kvilekval, Beverley O'Connor and Karen Wexler (all on alto recorders) with Diana Foster (on viola da gamba), wrapped up the performance part of our afternoon with a Concerto for 4 altos and continuo by Johann Christoph Schickhardt. Kudos to all of our performers! I hope that next year's program is just as enthusiastically performed and received; maybe it will even include other sizes of recorders!

After this musical feast, all the assembled company enjoyed time in the sun on the scenic deck, along with a delicious array of food and drink. In case you were wondering, that included hummus and crackers, diy shrimp cocktails, an amazing platter of cheeses, Rachel's lime and ginger dessert, and other savory and sweet delights, accompanied by wine and other beverages, as well as conversation and laughter.
