Dear Friends

It's now the end of another extraordinary year for RSLI, and I'm looking forward to seeing many of you at St Luke's on May 7, either in person or on my computer screen! What a brave new world it is that allows me to state this so matterof-factly!

Having hybrid meetings this year has been a wonderful way for RSLI to allow our members to experience the joy of playing together in person again, and also for us to continue to welcome those who don't live in the area (hello South Africa, Michigan, Maine, Massachusetts, Connecticut, New York City!) to join our music-making.

These meetings have been a special joy after more than a year without playing in the same room together, despite some challenges. One of those challenges is literally how to play together again, and I know the first meeting back in September was a bit of a shock for us all to find out that we didn't sound half as good as we did back in February 2020! After some work on blowing more and filling the room with sound, and on listening to each other, things improved greatly, to everyone's relief!

Back in January and February this year, we returned to Zoom meetings because the omicron variant made meeting in person too risky. I particularly enjoyed putting the February meeting together, as it allowed us to play a very different sort of music that might not have been so rewarding in person. We enjoyed a variety of folk music from around Europe, finding that, depending on who you ask, either the Klezmer dances or the Welsh lullaby were the highlights of that session.

The hybrid sessions of 2021-2022 have been a great way for RSLI to transition from the all-Zoom format of 2020-2021 to something much more akin to our former playing meetings. However, as those who are there during the tech set-up at St Luke know, it doesn't come easy. Setting up all the technology (power supply, computer, camera, microphone, speaker, wifi, Zoom connection) never seems to get easier. Getting all the devices to connect properly to the computer and then for the computer to connect properly with Zoom always feels like we are on the brink of disaster, and the connection itself always feels tenuous, since we depend on the wifi connection at St Luke's. And then we have to figure out where to put the camera so that our online participants can enjoy seeing their fellow players one side of the room for the first half, and the other for the second - which takes both patience and finesse. Somehow

we always manage it, but it feels miraculous each and every time! I couldn't have done this without the amazing help of Kara Kvilekval, and I want to take this opportunity to thank her, not only for her invaluable assistance with setting up (and breaking down) the technological elements we need for our meetings, but also for the loan of a microphone which has added to the quality of the online experience. THANK YOU, Kara!!!

One feature of the hybrid sessions that is not entirely recognized or understood by participants is one that requires a fair amount of preparation: a master seating chart and part assignments for each piece. My aim for our hybrid sessions is providing the best possible experience, not just for those in-person but also for those online. Unlike recordings (which are hopefully always accurate), with live players there is always a risk of mental mistakes or poor playing, and it's not easy to play along if the music is also problematic in some way. If this is tricky when you are in the same room, it is much more so when you are trying to play along with something that you have less physical connection with.

Therefore, to optimize the experience for our virtual participants, I carefully coordinate where players are sitting to make best use of their ensemble skills and serve as the central core of the sound, not just in the room but also for those joining us online. Our mentor system still supports our less secure players. These players generally have at least 2 stronger players/mentors near them, one of whom will double their part, giving a sense of safety to the player and a solidity to the group sound. This overall configuration of players comprises the master seating chart and ensures that our players are served best in terms of their play-along experience, and for those joining us online. I also try to ensure that players do change instruments during the session, not only for musical variety, but also, so that no one risks getting tendonitis from playing tenor for 2 hours straight.

If you think this all sounds very complicated and a lot of work, IT IS!!! It isn't dissimilar to creating seating charts for weddings! Those of you who have experienced this process will understand the challenges.... But it's worth it for the best possible time for all concerned. I'm able to do this, of course, because I know you all fairly well as players, and indeed I feel I know you all better than ever now! I've very much enjoyed the experience.

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Look What's Going On!

NAVRS North American Virtual Recorder Society

North American Virtual Recorder Society, a chapter of the American Recorder Society, is an online group of enthusiastic recorder players which meets on the last Saturday of each month. All levels of playing experience are welcome. The goal of NAVRS is to promote recorder in a "safe, inclusive place for playing".

Our own Rachel Begley is the Musical Director and Liz Yenetchi is Secretary. Guest conductors have included Rainer Beckman, Glenn Shannon and Gwyn Roberts.

Anyone can join. You can participate as a visitor once for \$15. After that you must join. The annual fee is \$20 with monthly meetings being \$15. Sessions run from 2 to 4pm ET, but doors open at 1:30 so you can be included in a chat group and get to know your fellow players. To learn more, go to their website at <u>NAVRS.org</u>. 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A Perspective from a Participant

After hearing about NAVRS at February's RSLI playing session, I took advantage of NAVRS' offer to play at their February session the following week, paying only the playing fee (\$15). I had such a good time that I became a 2022 member (\$20) and registered for the March session right away.

February's NAVRS meeting—"Moon-stars-Night-Sleep.....and the Shaking of the Sheets" was led by Annette Bauer. She focused on music featuring the Iullaby, moon, wakefulness and sleep from five centuries and as many different countries.

In March, Rainer Beckmann led us through "Frolick amongst the Trees," a celebration of the arrival of spring. He chose pieces including modern arrangements of traditional Brazilian tunes, modern U.S. compositions, English country dance and a Palestrina motet.



Forty plus players attended each meeting. The zoom door opens at 1:30 Eastern time which allowed the zoom host to divide us into breakout rooms of 6-8 people each, hosted by a NAVRS board member. One or two questions were used as conversation starters providing a great opportunity to get to know recorder players from around North America and even further away. Covid-19 is not the only reason why zoom sessions are valuable—a number of people are geographically remote from other players and relish the opportunity to play with others.

I'm enthusiastically looking forward to NAVRS upcoming playing sessions.

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### **Report from the Treasurer**

January 2020 – Report from the Treasurer: Greetings. I'd like to thank everyone for their generosity in donations; we've brought in \$715 throughout this playing season.

At year's end, RSLI has an account balance of \$12,414.85. Our dues have brought in \$528.63 and playing fees have brought in \$2374.25, which includes the full year for several of our players. Our expenses for the year are estimated at \$3800 for rent, conductor and admin fees, insurance, and Meetup and Huntington Arts Council expenses.


